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What is SNAP?

- **SNAP** stands for **S**pecific **N**eeds **A**wareness **P**lanning.
- **SNAP** is a voluntary disaster registry.
- **SNAP** provides search and rescue workers the vital information they need to help you after a disaster.
- **SNAP** provides information to emergency response agencies to assist in reuniting families and restoring and reconnecting essential services.
- **SNAP** helps emergency agencies plan and prepare to meet the needs of all citizens.
- **SNAP** stores your vital information on a secure internet registry that can be accessed only in a disaster by authorized emergency agencies.

Preparing for disasters in Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Saline and Thayer counties can be a SNAP

Registering with **SNAP** is a simple step you can take to prepare yourself for natural and man-made disasters.

Plan how you will be able to evacuate during a disaster. **Prepare** yourself and your family with disaster kits for your home and car.

Register with SNAP!

Why is SNAP important to me?

You may be very self-sufficient, and have a strong support system, but in a natural or man-made disaster, that independence can be threatened.

Is SNAP for me?

Ask yourself these questions:

- Do I rely on homemaking, personal care, or nursing visits to maintain independence in my home?
- Do I require life-sustaining equipment and uninterrupted electrical service?
- Am I medically fragile and will require special care and attention?
- Do I have physical limitations that substantially impair my mobility, strength, balance, vision, hearing or comprehension?

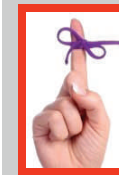
If you answered **“Yes”** to any of these questions, you should register with **SNAP**

You should **NOT** register :

- If you are fully able and healthy.
- If you reside in a nursing facility that is protected by a State required disaster plan.



Enrolling in the registry should *never* be considered as the only action necessary to prepare for disasters, nor does it ensure prompt, thorough, or priority response after a disaster strikes.



Registrations must be updated annually to remain active.

Participants will receive an annual reminder for your registration information.

Prepare a Disaster Supply Kit

You should keep six basics stocked in your home for disasters:

- Water
- Food
- First Aid Supplies, including medications
- Clothing and bedding
- Tools and emergency supplies
- Special items (example—pet care)
