Welcome to the 2017 Local Recycling Resource Directory provided to you by Public Health Solutions District Health Department serving residents in Fillmore, Gage, Jefferson, Saline and Thayer counties.

PHS has a long history of program and initiatives to promote litter reduction and recycling. With limited access to recycling programs for a large portion of the PHS district, an overall low recycling rate across the state, and increasing rates of recyclable material being dumped into landfills, we feel that the time is right to focus efforts on litter reduction, recycling, repurposing, and reuse in our rural counties.

A recent study showed that Nebraskan's spent an estimated \$33.5 million in one year alone (2013), disposing of materials that could have been recycled. PHS would like to help decrease the amount of recycled items that end up in our local landfills.

The 2017 Local Recycling Resource Directory provides a list of resources in one easily accessible location regarding recycling, household waste disposal, donating of goods, material exchange and prescription take back sites. 

## What is recycling?

Recycling is the process of collecting and processing materials that would otherwise be thrown away as trash and turning them into new products. Recycling can benefit your community and the environment.



## Benefits of Recycling

- Reduces the amount of waste sent to landfills and combustion facilities
- Conserves natural resources such as timber, water, and minerals
- Prevents pollution by reducing the need to collect new raw materials
- Saves energy
- Reduces greenhouse gas emissions that contribute to global climate change
- Helps sustain the environment for future generations
- Helps create new well-paying jobs in the recycling and manufacturing industries in the United States

## How do I Recycle?

Deciding to recycle items is just the first step, you also want to make sure the items are recycled correctly. Below you will find recycling guidelines by material.

### Aluminum and tin cans

**Acceptable:** aluminum cans; steel (tin) cans; aerosol cans. Empty and clean. Liquids and food residue must be removed. Labels are okay.

**Not Acceptable:** Aluminum pans and foil; metal objects; hanger; cans containing food or liquid residue.

### Plastic Products

**Acceptable:** Styrofoam products; motor oil or chemical containers; plastic plates, cups or eating utensils; plastic film (grocery sacks); metal of any kind; bulky, rigid plastics larger than 5 gallons; flower pots; K-cups.

### Newspaper

**Acceptable:** newspaper and inserts; newsprint packing paper.

**Not Acceptable:** plastic bags; product samples; wet or soiled newsprint.

### Mixed Paper

**Acceptable:** mail, magazines, catalogs; telephone directories; paperback books; molded paper egg cartons; paper packaging (e.g., cereal, frozen dinner boxes).

**Not Acceptable:** paper plates; coffee cups; paper towels or tissues; soiled or wet paper.

## **Corrugated Cardboard**

**Acceptable:** clean and dry corrugated cardboard, paper packaging (e.g., cereal, frozen dinner boxes).

**Not Acceptable:** waxed cardboard; packing material; styrofoam; plastic of any kind; wet or solid cardboard.

## **Glass Bottles and Jars**

**Acceptable:** some curbside recyclers do not accept glass bottles and jars in their single stream recycling containers. Empty and clean. Labels are ok.

**Not Acceptable:** window glass; drinking glass; mirrors; dishes and cups; vases; ceramic products. Glass bottles and jars with liquids or food residue.

## **Batteries**

Some batteries contain heavy metals such as mercury, lead, cadmium, and nickel; therefore, many communities do not allow them to be thrown away with your regular trash. Recycling is always the best option for disposing of used batteries.

- Lead-Acid Car Batteries can be returned to almost any store that sells car batteries. The lead and plastics from the batteries can then be recycled and used to manufacture new products. About 99 percent of lead-acid car batteries are recycled.
- Dry-Cell Batteries are used in a variety of electronics and include alkaline and carbon zinc (9-volt, D, C, AA, AAA), mercuric-oxide (button, some cylindrical and rectangular), silver-oxide and zinc-air (button), and lithium (9-volt, C, AA, coin, button, rechargeable) batteries. Look for in-store recycling bins or community collection events to dispose of these.

## **Used Oil**

Never dump your used motor oil down the drain — the used oil from one oil change can contaminate one million gallons of fresh water. By recycling your used oil you not only help keep our water supply clean, but help reduce American dependence on foreign oil. It takes 42 gallons of crude oil, but only one gallon of used oil, to produce 2.5 quarts of new motor oil. Many garages and auto-supply stores that sell motor oil also accept oil for recycling.

## **Tires**

Disease-carrying pests such as rodents and mosquitoes may live in tire piles. Tire piles can also catch on fire. Most garages are required to accept and recycle your used tires when you have new ones installed. You may be able to return used tires to either a tire retailer or a local recycling facility that accepts tires. Some communities will hold collection events for used tires.



# Steps to Recycling Materials

There are several methods for collecting recyclables, including curbside. After collection, recyclables are sent to a recovery facility to be sorted, cleaned and processed into materials that can be used in manufacturing. Recyclables are bought and sold just like raw materials would be, and prices go up and down depending on supply and demand in the United States.

More and more of today's products are being manufactured with recycled content. Common household items that contain recycled materials include the following:

- Newspapers and paper towels
- Aluminum, plastic, and glass soft drink containers
- Steel cans
- Plastic laundry detergent bottles

Recycled materials are also used in new ways such as recovered glass in asphalt to pave roads or recovered plastic in carpeting and park benches.

You help close the recycling loop by buying new products made from recycled materials. There are thousands of products that contain recycled content. When you go shopping, look for the following:

- Products that can be easily recycled
- Products that contain recycled content

Below are some of the terms used:

**Recycled-content product** - The product was manufactured with recycled materials either collected from a recycling program or from waste recovered during the normal manufacturing process. The label will sometimes include how much of the content was from recycled materials.

**Post-consumer content** - Very similar to recycled content, but the material comes only from recyclables collected from consumers or businesses through a recycling program.

**Recyclable product** - Products that can be collected, processed and manufactured into new products after they have been used. These products do not necessarily contain recycled materials. Remember not all kinds of recyclables may be collected in your community so be sure to check with your local recycling program before you buy.



# Reducing and Reusing Basics

The most effective way to reduce waste is to not create it in the first place. Making a new product requires a lot of materials and energy - raw materials must be extracted from the earth, and the product must be fabricated then transported to wherever it will be sold. As a result, reduction and reuse are the most effective ways you can save natural resources, protect the environment and save money.

## Benefits of Reducing and Reusing

- Prevents pollution caused by reducing the need to harvest new raw materials
- Saves energy
- Reduces greenhouse gas emissions that contribute to global climate change
- Helps sustain the environment for future generations
- Saves money
- Reduces the amount of waste that will need to be recycled or sent to landfills and incinerators
- Allows products to be used to their fullest extent



## Ideas on How to Reduce and Reuse

- **Buy used.** You can find everything from clothes to building materials at specialized reuse centers and consignment shops. Often, used items are less expensive and just as good as new.
- Look for products that use less packaging. When manufacturers make their products with less packaging, they use less raw material. This reduces waste and costs. These extra savings can be passed along to the consumer. Buying in bulk, for example, can reduce packaging and save money.
- Buy reusable over disposable items. Look for items that can be reused; the little things can add up. For example, you can bring your own silverware and cup to work, rather than using disposable items.
- Maintain and repair products, like clothing, tires and appliances, so that they won't have to be thrown out and replaced as frequently.
- Borrow, rent or share items that are used infrequently, like party decorations, tools or furniture.



## Household Waste Disposal

Municipal solid waste (also called trash or garbage) is defined as wastes consisting of everyday items such as product packaging, grass clippings, furniture, clothing, bottles and cans, food scraps, newspapers, appliances, consumer electronics, and batteries. These wastes come from homes, institutions such as schools and hospitals, and commercial sources such as restaurants and small businesses. Once generated, MSW must be collected and managed. Common management methods include recovery for recycling or composting, combustion (with the resulting energy used to generate electricity or steam in some cases), and landfill disposal. Many wastes that are disposed of in landfills represent a loss of materials that could be reused, recycled, or converted to energy.

### Items that belong in the trash



Diapers	Single use products

### Household Hazardous Waste

Leftover household products that contain corrosive, toxic, ignitable, or reactive ingredients are considered to be household hazardous waste (HHW). Products such as paints, cleaners, oils, batteries, and pesticides that contain potentially hazardous ingredients require special care when you dispose of them. HHW may be dangerous to people or bad for the environment if poured down the drain, dumped on the ground, or thrown out with regular trash.

What you can do:

- Try to reduce your purchases of these products and look for alternative, non-hazardous products.
- When you do need to dispose of these products, look for special collection events in your community or permanent collection centers. Sometimes businesses that sell these products will also accept them for recycling.
- If you have to dispose of HHW, first check with your local waste management agency to see what rules apply in your community.



## Donation

One person's trash is another person's treasure. Instead of discarding unwanted appliances, tools or clothes, try selling or donating them. Not only will you be reducing waste, you'll be helping others. Local churches, community centers, thrift stores, schools and nonprofit organizations may accept a variety of donated items, including used books, working electronics and unneeded furniture.

### Benefits of Donation

- Prevents usable goods from going into landfills
- Helps your community and those in need
- Tax benefits may be available

## Prescription Drug Take Back

The National Prescription Drug Take Back Day aims to provide a safe, convenient, and responsible means of disposing of prescription drugs, while also educating the general public about the potential for abuse and medications. This annual event is important in preventing accidental poisonings as well as in protecting our water. So if your prescription medications have expired or you are no longer taking them, Drug Take Back Day is a way to make sure they are disposed of properly. It's simple and easy. Gather them up and take them to a disposal site near you. It's free and anonymous, no questions asked.

## The Nebraska Materials Exchange Program

The Nebraska Materials Exchange Program encourages businesses and manufacturers across Nebraska to review disposal costs and examine the management of their waste products. Good, usable materials that are no longer needed can be listed in the Materials Exchange Program. The cost is free. Keep Nebraska Beautiful is proud to offer this program and anticipates continued growth and success.

Participating in the program saves money and space associated with storage, disposal, and overall landfill waste. Many schools and businesses have saved hundreds of dollars by seeking materials through the Exchange Program instead of purchasing new items. Currently more than 2 million pounds of materials are exchanged every month. Listings include food plastic, metals, rubber, chemicals, oils and waxes, surplus equipment, containers and pallets, paint, glass, textiles, electronics, paper, cardboard and wood.

# State and Federal Regulations and Programs

## **Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ)**

The Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality's mission is to protect the quality of Nebraska's environment – our air, land, and water resources. The Nebraska Legislature created the Environmental Quality Council in 1971 as the public body that adopts rules and regulations for the Department of Environmental Quality to administer.

**The Environmental Quality Council (EQC)** is a 17-member public body appointed by the Governor to represent specific interests and adopt regulations that are then administered by the NDEQ. The Nebraska Legislature has delegated authority to the Council to adopt regulations on a broad range of environmental subjects to carry out the intent of the Legislature and the purpose of specific legislative Acts. The Council has, for example, adopted standards applicable to air, water, and land quality to protect public health and welfare.

## **Land Management Division**

The Land Management Division is comprised of the Waste Management Section, the Remediation Section, and the Planning and Aid Unit.

### **Integrated Waste Management Program**

Solid Waste regulations are incorporated in NDEQ Title 132 - Integrated Solid Waste Management Regulations. The purpose of the program is to ensure proper management of solid waste. Solid waste includes municipal solid waste typically collected and disposed in municipal landfills, and other nonhazardous waste. The regulations provide technical criteria for land disposal areas and solid waste processing facilities.

### **Waste Tire Management Program**

Approved beneficial uses of waste tires are outlined in Department regulations. Waste tire haulers are required to obtain individual permits annually and are required to post financial assurance. Financial assurance is designed to provide adequate funds to clean up any waste tires that are illegally disposed by the transporter.

### **Waste Planning and Aid**

Waste Planning and Aid includes the following programs: the Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grants Program; the Litter Reduction and Recycling Grant Program; the Illegal Dumpsite Cleanup Program; and the Landfill Disposal Fee Rebate Program.

## Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grants Program

In 1990, the Nebraska Legislature passed Legislative Bill 163, the Waste Reduction and Recycling Act, which created the Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Grants Program.

### The Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Fund

- Provides grants to assist in financing sound integrated waste management programs and projects. These programs and projects may include but are not limited to: recycling systems; market development for recyclable materials; intermediate processing facilities and facilities using recyclable materials in new products; yard waste composting and composting with sewage sludge; waste reduction and waste exchange; household hazardous waste programs; the consolidation of solid waste disposal facilities and use of transfer stations; and incineration for energy recovery. A portion of the grants is also obligated to fund scrap tire recycling or reduction projects and a portion of the grants are available to smaller cities and counties for abandoned building deconstruction.

### Litter Reduction and Recycling Grant Program

- The Litter Reduction and Recycling Grant Program has been in existence since 1979. Its purpose is to provide funds to support programs to reduce litter, provide education, and promote recycling in Nebraska.

### Illegal Dumpsite Cleanup Program

- The Illegal Dumpsite Cleanup Program, established in 1997, is a cleanup program that provides funding assistance to political subdivisions for the cleanup of solid waste disposed of along public roadways or ditches. Through this program, items such as household waste, white goods, construction and demolition waste, and furniture, are removed from the illegal site and disposed in a permitted facility or recycled.

### Landfill Disposal Fee Rebate Program

- The Landfill Disposal Fee Rebate Program was created as an incentive to political subdivisions to support and encourage the purchasing of products, materials, or supplies that are manufactured or produced from recycled material. Funding for the program is drawn from the Waste Reduction and Recycling Incentive Fund.

## **Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) Program**

The purpose of the RCRA program is to ensure proper management of hazardous wastes from the point of generation until final disposal.

The NDEQ was authorized in 1985 by EPA to administer portions of the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) program. RCRA regulations are incorporated in NDEQ Title 128 - Nebraska Hazardous Waste Regulations, which is updated as the Federal RCRA regulations change.

## **Superfund Program**

The Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act (CERCLA) became federal law in 1980. CERCLA established what has commonly become known as Superfund to deal with known or suspected contamination at inactive commercial/industrial/military facilities or so called “uncontrolled hazardous waste or abandoned sites.” The nation’s most contaminated sites are listed on the National Priorities List (NPL). Nebraska currently has thirteen sites on the National Priorities List.

The investigation and remediation of contaminated sites are the primary responsibility of the EPA and other federal agencies. NDEQ participates in the Superfund process by serving as a technical support agency to the EPA and as the environmental representative for the State of Nebraska.

## **Nebraska Voluntary Cleanup Program**

The Remedial Action Plan Monitoring Act (RAPMA), initially created in 1995, established the Nebraska Voluntary Cleanup Program (VCP). The Voluntary Cleanup Program provides property owners and parties responsible for contamination with a mechanism for developing voluntary environmental cleanup plans that are reviewed and approved by the Department.

The Department has a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with EPA Region VII, which provides federal approval of voluntary cleanup programs. Under this agreement, any site that joins the voluntary cleanup program and successfully completes the cleanup action is assured that EPA will not pursue federal enforcement under CERCLA.

## **Brownfield Assessments and Cleanups**

A brownfield site is a vacant or under-used industrial or commercial property where expansion or redevelopment is complicated by unresolved contamination concerns. The voluntary cleanup program performs assessments and cleanups at brownfield sites in Nebraska. These assessments and cleanups are performed by NDEQ, typically with federal funds, at no cost to interested parties in Nebraska communities.

## **U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)**

The EPA regulates household, industrial, and manufacturing solid and hazardous wastes under the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA). RCRA’s goals are to protect us from the hazards of waste disposal; conserve energy and natural resources by recycling and recovery; reduce or eliminate waste; and clean up waste that which may have spilled, leaked or been improperly disposed of.

## **Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) Laws and Regulations**

The Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) is the public law that creates the framework for the proper management of hazardous and non-hazardous solid waste. The law describes the waste management program mandated by Congress that gave EPA authority to develop the RCRA program.

The Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) protects communities and resource conservation. To achieve this, EPA develops regulations, guidance and policies that ensure the safe management and cleanup of solid and hazardous waste, and programs that encourage source reduction and beneficial reuse.

The Solid Waste Program, under RCRA Subtitle D, encourages states to develop comprehensive plans to manage nonhazardous industrial solid waste and municipal solid waste, sets criteria for municipal solid waste landfills and other solid waste disposal facilities, and prohibits the open dumping of solid waste.

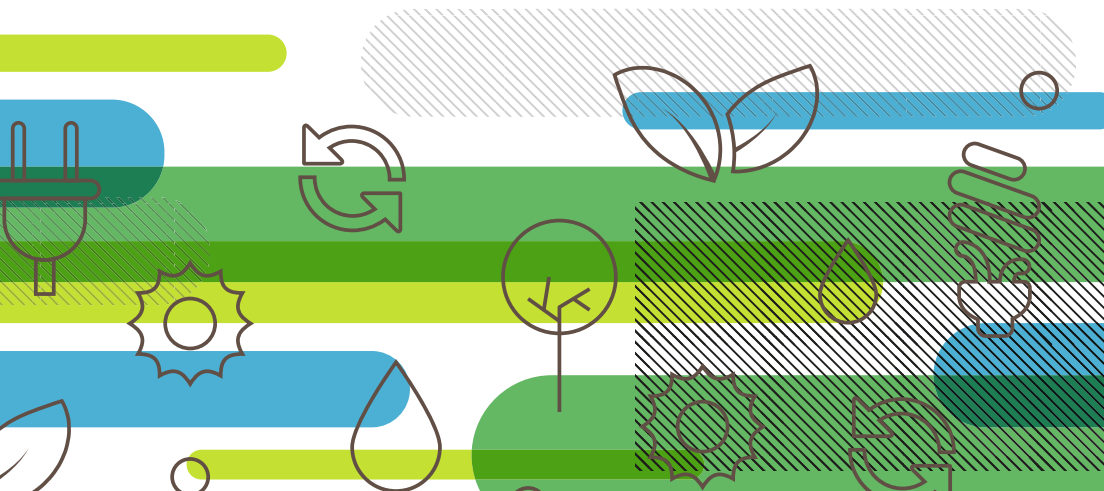
